1. Morphological / Structural Changes

 Goitre, large, irregular, knotty – Spong.
 Nodulated thyroid – Iod., Phyt.
 Resistant swelling of middle lobe – Nat-c.
 Soft, vascular goitre – Calc., Apis

2. Sensory Perceptions & Local Sensations

Pain on pressure or motion – Iod.
 Pain on swallowing – Spong.
 Sensation of constriction – Iod.
 Moving sensation while swallowing – Spong.
 Stinging, stitching pains – Spong.
